The <u>American Society of Adaptation Professionals</u> (ASAP) <u>Regional Adaptation Leadership Award</u> (RALA) recognizes individuals who have distinguished themselves in the climate change adaptation field through exceptional leadership. It recognizes the fact that deliberate, proactive adaptation, preparedness, and resilience-building is a change process, a deviation from business-as-usual, and a courageous act of doing something new and different. At its heart are individuals who make this change happen, sometimes with very few resources. The RALA recognizes distinguished adaptation leaders who approach their work in a strategic, sophisticated, well informed, inclusive, and effective manner.

ASAP's two award programs, the Regional Adaptation Leadership Award and the Prize for Progress, highlight excellence in adaptation leadership and excellence in adaptation practices of communities and organizations, respectively. These programs are a critical component of ASAP's work supporting and connecting adaptation professionals to advance innovation and excellence in the field of climate change adaptation.

Help us make history by <u>nominating</u> those most deserving of recognition for their work on climate change adaptation in Texas. The RALA awardee(s) will be recognized at a regional event, to be determined pending position within the COVID-19 pandemic.

Award Prizes include: a year of ASAP membership (valued at \$150), travel assistance to the 2021 National Adaptation Forum, and a year of promotion through ASAP's Adaptation Voices programs.

All climate change adaptation professionals, from any sector, who work in Texas are eligible for this award. For individuals based in Texas who work in multiple places, the nomination should specifically focus on their Texas work. The following are **not eligible** for the award::

However, if you copy/paste the content directly into the form, it will count in scoring.

Therefore, the field of climate change adaptation must identify, recognize, support, and inspire leaders with these identities and backgrounds. We strongly encourage nominations by and of such people.
